## A BILL

To direct the Secretary of the department in which the Coast Guard is operating to study and report to the Congress regarding recreational vessel operator training.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Brianna Lieneck Boat-
- 5 ing Safety Act of 2025".

1	SEC. 2. RECREATIONAL VESSEL OPERATOR EDUCATION
2	AND TRAINING.
3	(a) In General.—Not later than 180 days after the
4	date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of the depart-
5	ment in which the Coast Guard is operating shall study
6	and report to the Committee on Transportation and Infra-
7	structure of the House of Representatives and the Com-
8	mittee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the
9	Senate regarding recreational vessel operator training.
10	The study and report shall include a review of—
11	(1) Coast Guard Auxiliary and Power Squadron
12	training programs;
13	(2) existing State boating education programs,
14	including programs by the National Association of
15	State Boating Law Administrators (in this section
16	referred to as "NASBLA"); and
17	(3) other hands-on training programs available
18	to recreational vessel operators.
19	(b) INCLUDED SUBJECTS.—The study shall specifi-
20	cally examine—
21	(1) course materials;
22	(2) course content;
23	(3) training methodology;
24	(4) assessment methodology; and
25	(5) relevancy of course content to risks for rec-
26	reational boaters.

1	(c) Contents of Report.—The report under this
2	section shall include—
3	(1) a section regarding steps the Coast Guard
4	and NASBLA have taken to encourage States to
5	adopt mandatory recreational vessel operator train-
6	ing;
7	(2) an evaluation of the ability of the States to
8	harmonize their education programs and testing pro-
9	cedures;
10	(3) an analysis of the extent States have pro-
11	vided reciprocity among the States for their respec-
12	tive mandatory and voluntary education require-
13	ments and programs;
14	(4) a section examining the level of uniformity
15	of education and training between the States that
16	currently have mandatory education and training
17	programs;
18	(5) a section outlining the minimum standards
19	for education of recreational vessel operators;
20	(6) a section analyzing how a Federal training
21	and testing program can be harmonized with State
22	training and testing programs;
23	(7) an analysis of course content and delivery
24	methodology for relevancy to risks for recreational
25	boaters;

1	(8) a description of the current phase-in periods
2	for mandatory boater education in State mandatory
3	education programs and recommendation for the
4	phase-in period for a mandatory boater education
5	program including an evaluation as to whether the
6	phase-in period affects course availability and cost;
7	(9) a description of the extent States allow for
8	experienced boaters to bypass mandatory education
9	courses and go directly to testing;
10	(10) recommendations for a bypass option for
11	experienced boaters;
12	(11) a section analyzing how the Coast Guard
13	would administer a Federal boating education, train-
14	ing, and testing program; and
15	(12) an analysis of the extent to which a Fed-
16	eral boating education, training, and testing pro-
17	gram should be required for all waters of a State,
18	including internal waters.
